

It's understandable that so many people are just lurching from one day to the next without much of a plan.

Even I've really struggled to implement my plans so far this year - and I'm someone who normally has a plan for everything and checks off those to-dos each day! So if you're feeling rudderless, please know that you are not alone.

However, as challenging as this time has been, we can still find direction and make progress. It

may be time now to look up and take a deep breath and get ready to tackle something.

Pick a Date & Set A Micro-Goal

The end of the month is approaching as I write this. It's another opportunity for reflection and planning, another fresh start. Thanks to a heavily connected world and more awareness of other cultures, there are many opportunities throughout the year for this kind of rejuvenation. Lunar New Year, Eid, the solstices, new moons... take your pick.



You don't really need a big date in the calendar to find that. Any day can provide it. But if you're someone who needs a psychological trigger then pick a Monday, or the first day of a new month and start from there. Start with something small and easily attainable. Pick a goal so laughably easy that there's really no way you can fail to accomplish it. Exactly what that might be depends entirely upon your unique

like those kitchen cupboards, and get rid of old ideas. If a project isn't moving you in the right direction, then set it aside. If something has been weighing you down, then unburden yourself.

It doesn't benefit you to carry baggage. That might be projects that don't inspire you, or obligations that are more chore than enthusiasm, it might also be ideas about yourself.

Clear Your Mind

We all have automatic negative thoughts about ourselves, or fixed mindsets about things. But we can learn to overcome them. If you've been telling yourself that you'll never finish that novel, or that no one likes your books, then it's time to cast that negative self-talk aside.

If you feel that thought intruding then stop it in its tracks and try saying the opposite out loud. Instead of thinking "I'm not good enough", say "I love and accept myself just as I am". There may be a voice that says "that's not true", or "no I don't". In which case, try "I am learning to accept myself", or "I am developing as a writer", or whatever fits your personal doubts. Pick a phrase that you can accept as true and use it as a pattern interrupter for your inner critic.

The truth is that you CAN accomplish your goals. You just need to reassess them at regular intervals and employ little tricks to get you over hurdles. Maybe you can't leap them, but can clamber over with a step up. So create those steps for yourself. Set yourself up for success with prompts and cues that will help you get into the right frame of mind.

This is why I love micro-goals so much. They take the overwhelm out of the equation. They are a stepping stone to something more. It's always a good idea to keep your Big Why in mind, but right now, with the world the way it is, it's not essential. It might be best to just keep your focus on the next step.

So, this season:

declutter your to do list,

- ditch the stuff that isn't serving you,
- pick a day to take the next step,
- · set a micro-goal that moves you forward,
- Interrupt your inner critic with positive statements

Things are looking up. Life might not be back to normal (not by a long shot)


and a lot may be out of our control, but in the words of Norman Vincent Peale, author of The Power of Positive Thinking, "Change your thoughts and you change your world."

Positivity is defined by the Great God Google and Oxford Languages as: "The practice of being or tendency to be positive or optimistic in attitude." The word itself is more than 350 years old and, fun fact, is actually much older than the word "negativity," which apparently did not show up until the 19th century. For whatever reason, positivity has a bit of a bad rap as being not a "real word," enough that Merriam-Webster actually spent the time to write a post about it under their Word History(1) heading. Um. So. Regardless of the apparent teeth-gnashing going on, positivity

has been around a long time and is likely here to stay.

Etymology aside and more importantly, we could all do with more of it. Positivity, that is. More gentleness, more patience, more understanding. More of that unconditional positive regard that we should all aspire to give others and all hope for ourselves.

That was followed quickly with, "Wait, no. Don't stop there," because I am at my very core, the kid who wants to make friends on the playground. I still wish they had taken more callers that day. Of course, they were the Morning Crew, and joking was what they did best. They picked another topic and the world spun on.

That conversation and its aftermath (read: "noooooo!") is one I remember pretty vividly, even after all this time. The perfect package of a pretty cool moment and a cringy C If we forget our own achievements, lost in the shadows one, all wrapped up in

that these Radio Personalities were interested enough to ask for all the deets on my book, but I haven't really told anyone else about it. I'm not entirely sure why. Maybe because in an ideal world my bit would not have been the end of the story? It would have kept going, adding all the other callers that came after and the fun/silly/amazing things they had done that they never thought they would do.

Might as well just stop right there.

They were joking ... being funny and I'm grateful because, come on, they said so many nice things! Yet that last bit also sent a message to everyone else listening, that their wins weren't good enough. This type of comparison is damaging, like termites chewing away below the surface of a fresh coat of paint, and it is so subtle and so systemic that we forget it is there. It becomes a litany in the back of our minds, of how very far we think we have to go, that we forget

where we are, where we have come from and what we have achieved.

If we forget our own achievements, lost in the shadows of what others have done, how do we remember what we are doing, and where we are going?

It's a trap!

My point is, we are socially conditioned to compare ourselves against the accomplishment of others, by media, by our cultures, and even by our families. Not a bad thing if it is motivating. Not a good thing if it

known and oft repeated that we are our own

worst critics. There are jokes about it, and endless memes, and I almost fell down a meme hole just now. They all go pretty much the same: I can do this. Work hard. This is terrible. Work harder. Maybe this is okay. It's not okay - burn it. Work some more, etc., until finally you have a product you think maybe, possibly, it might be sort of okay if other people look at it. Not too closely.

Wait.

are doing, and where we are going? **)**

Scratch that, it needs another edit.

Or, better idea ... I have this bag of cookies that really needs some attention.

We are our own worst critics. We are our own worst enemies. Combine our own self-doubt and second-guessing with the powerful outside influences of the constant white noise of all-of-the-everyones-who-doit-better and well, you have to turn the music up pretty loud to drown it all out.

These tendencies we have, to beat on ourselves, are memes not because they are rare. We all do it, at some point or another.

Did you know? There is a term in Psychology, called Negativity Bias. An article on the website VeryWellMind articulates it well: "The negative bias is our tendency not only to register negative stimuli more readily but also to dwell on these events. [...] we feel the sting of a rebuke more powerfully than we feel the joy of praise." Further in, it says, "Neuroscientific evidence has shown that there is greater neural processing in the brain in response to negative stimuli." In essence, we are hard-wired to pay more attention to negative feedback. It affects us more strongly than positive feedback. How is that a thing??

Yet we all know that being creative depends on positivity. Your inspiration might not always be happiness, but you need positivity to be creative. At a minimum, it gives you the confidence to try, knowing you can and will succeed.

This brings me to my second point for today (and you've heard this one before): Comparisons should not be to find faults in your work, but to find opportunities to grow. What can we learn from the creations of those we admire?

When you find yourself wondering, "Why am I stuck?" listen to your self-talk. Be mindful of the people and other influences around you. You don't need to cut Uncle Humphrey out of your life (because who can? His art is food and he brings the main course at Thanksgiving), but knowing there is a negative influence in your life makes it easier to manage. Cultivate positive feedback with other people as support, friends or other family members. Or find a group of like-minded people, such as the fabulous World Indie Warriors, for Indie Creatives (wink, wink). Being aware of how negative world news affects you will let you control

your exposure to it, and you can take it in small doses, giving positive influences a chance to overcome it ... for your own wellbeing.

To think of it another way, picture the Perfect Picture and know that if it were framed from another direction, it might not have looked as good, or wonderful, or majestic. That doesn't mean you're hiding something, or being deceitful, or fooling yourself. It's about perspective.

The artist chooses what to focus on and that is a lot of what the road to Positivity is about.

Takeaways

Being positive and having positivity is more than a mantra, more than meditation or whatever method you choose to keep your Zen, or do to build the energy to break through a creative wall. Those things can be part of it, but we have to be mindful of what might be eating away at it.

So, for this year and beyond, be kind to yourself. Limit your negative influences. There is a reason they say to surround yourself with positive people. Now that we know about negative bias, we know that positive feedback is fighting under a handicap. Stack the deck in your favor. Be skeptical of what society says you should be. Choose what to focus on and speak/paint/picture your own truth. Don't be your own enemy and frame your comparisons for growth.

Finally, Positivity is an actual real word.

To leave you with one final quote, from my favorite (and the somewhat creepy) master of horror, Stephen King: "You can, you should, and if you're brave enough to start, you will."

Look out, 2021!



Interview with Heather Grace Stewart

Meet Heather Grace Stewart, a Canadian Poet, Author and Journalist. After gaining her graduate diploma in journalism and working as a chief reporter and associate editor for different publications, she started her freelance writing and editing business, Graceful Publications, in 1999.

Heather's books were traditionally published till 2016 when she decided to retain all rights to her work and go the self-publishing route.

With 18 published works, both fiction and poetry, she is an accomplished writer and one of her novels, The Ticket, a romantic comedy inspired by a true story, became an International Kindle Bestseller. It has also been optioned to become a movie or television series. Most recently, it was translated into a French and can be found as audiobook as well.

A few years ago, Heather decided to use the proceeds from her poetry collection to benefit those who need it more. It is her way of paying it forward, using her talent for creative writing to pave the way for the younger generation to expand their horizons.

In Heather's own words:

"My company Graceful Publications began sponsoring Miriam, now 15, and her community in October 2018. All proceeds from sales of my poetry books go to sponsoring her through Plan Canada's Because I Am A Girl program. I've always felt that educating girls is the key to solving a lot of our world's problems, so decided the small amount of money my poetry books make might be best put to use in this area.

Miriam's community is in Villa Adela, located in the Northeast of Bolivia. The majority of people live in small houses made of adobe and straw roofs. The families are farmers. There's very little access to health services and there are few kindergartens in the communities. There are not many teachers, and secondary schools can only be found in the more populated centers. On average, adolescents have to walk one or even two hours to reach their schools.

A year after Graceful Publications started sponsoring her, Miriam wrote to us and told us she was now attending school daily and sent some photos. She was very grateful, she wrote, "that you are so kind and do not forget about me."

Plan Canada reports that over the years, ten schools have been built in Miriam's area and adolescents, especially girls, have been given support and training about their own health and gender-based violence. Globally in 2020-2021, our donations have helped families secure shelters during disasters like Covid-19, stop child marriages in Bangladesh, and send home-learning materials to children in Uganda."

Because I Am A Girl is Plan International's global initiative to support and increase girl's and young women's rights through education and awareness.

According to them, globally, nearly 130 million girls are not at school, nearly 12 million girls are married before the age of 18, and approximately 16 millions girls aged between 15 and 19 give birth every year.

Girls the world over are continually facing obstacles and barriers that violate their rights and prevent them from growing and thriving to become all they can be. It's discrimination and perpetuates gender-based violence, leading to girls having few opportunities to get educated, being married at a very young age and getting pregnant while still being children themselves."

If you are interested in helping Heather help Miriam, her village and many other continued on 11 girls and their families the world over, please consider purchasing one of Heather's poetry books, all of which can be found on Amazon.

Her most recent book is a reflection on life during the current pandemic and contains a wonderful collection of funny, quirky, beautiful and thoughtful poems which all are well worth a read. Not only will you contribute to a better future for these girls, but you will also be able to enjoy some relatable, down-to-earth and heartfelt poetry that will leave you smiling and make your world seem a little brighter.

About Plan International:

In 1937, British journalist John Langdon-Davies and refugee worker Eric Muggeridge founded Plan International and made it the organization's mission to promote and protect children's rights. Its original aim was to provide food, accommodation and education to children whose lives had been disrupted by the Spanish Civil War.

Langdon-Davies' idea was to create a personal relationship between a child and a sponsor. This would put the child at the center, and 80 years later, it's still the core belief of all of Plan International's continuing work.

Today, it is a global organization which is active in 75 countries and works to advance children's rights and equality for girls. Over the next five years, their ambition is to transform the lives 100 million girls.

"Plan International is standing with girls and young women by providing a platform, opportunities and support for them to become leaders and make change happen. Once girls are aware of their rights and can exercise them, they can successfully advocate for change in their lives, in their community, or around the world. For example, we have seen girls at the forefront of movements to end Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) in their community or ban child marriage in their country.

Equality will not be a reality until the world recognizes the inherent power and potential of youth - especially girls. We are on Team

Girl but that does not mean we exclude boys from our work, in fact we actively engage men and boys in our efforts to advance equality. Important shifts and real, lasting change require everyone to be involved in the process. Together, we can create a new and equitable normal over time."

reflect as much creative diversity and talent as we can.


